## **Dental Procedures, Scans Protocol**

## Wooler Health does not prescribe sedatives like diazepam for any procedure or scan being undertaken outside of our practice, this includes MRI scans and dental procedures

This policy decision has been made by the GP Partners and is adhered to by all prescribers working in the practice. The reasons for this can be found below:

- GPs are not involved, trained or appraised in sedation skills and are not able to provide the correct level of sedation for a procedure or a scan.
- People respond differently to sedation, you may not feel any benefit or you could become too sleepy and your procedure may need to be cancelled. Too much sedation can have a negative affect on your breathing and even lead to death. Patients need to be monitored closely at the time and for a period afterwards.
- Although medication like diazepam makes a lot of people sleepy, it can have the opposite effect and make people more aggressive or agitated.
- Benzodiazepines (e.g. diazepam) may cause drowsiness, impair concentration and impair decision making which may impair a person's ability to drive home afterwards
- According to the prescribing guidelines doctors follow, (known as the BNF), benzodiazepines like diazepam are not recommended for use in phobias. Your doctor would be taking a significant legal risk by prescribing against these guidelines. They are only licensed for short term use during a crisis in generalised anxiety and can be prescribed by your dentist or consultant.
- Diazepam stays in your system for quite a while. If your job requires you to submit to random drug testing, you may fail this having taken diazepam.

Fear of dental procedures and medical scans should be discussed with your dentist or consultant who may prescribe for you if they feel it is appropriate.
